May Worship Overview

Following the Pilgrim COVID-19 Preparedness Plan (posted on the Pilgrim website), we are now in Phase 3 of the re-opening process. That means that the Pilgrim building will occasionally be opened for gatherings in a way that allows us to be together in limited numbers while also observing practices for health and safety. In May, Pilgrim will offer Sunday morning worship on the Zoom platform, with the exception of May 2, an outdoor worship service of confirmation.

Sunday Worship in May Virtual Gatherings via Zoom

Using the Zoom platform enables us to see each other on screen, share joys and concerns by typing in the chat section, and stay for coffee time and forum following worship. For those unable to attend at 9:30 am, a worship recording will be available later.

9:20 am — Zoom gathering opens for arriving and pre-worship conversation. Prelude begins around **9:27 am**

9:30 am — Worship via Zoom

10:20 am — Coffee Conversation via Zoom, following worship (Not on May 2)

10:20 am − PreK to Grade 2 (May 2 Only IN-PERSON OUTSIDE)

10:30 am — High School Pathways (May 9 Only IN-PERSON OUTSIDE)

10:40 am — Forum via Zoom (May 9, 16, and 23 ONLY)

Worship each Sunday morning includes "**Point for Pilgrims**" — an opportunity for children and their families to experience the Bible story in an engaging way.

Summer 2021 — Returning to In-Person Worship

Beginning **June 6**, Pilgrim will begin to offer in-person indoor worship. Returning to in-person indoor worship means the following:

- 1. In-person worshipers will need to register in advance for worship, observe social distancing in the sanctuary, and wear a mask.
- 2. In-person worship will not include singing.
- 3. Staff and Lay Leaders will pay careful attention to concerns and needs of participants.
- 4. In-person worship will be broadcast for online worshipers on Facebook Live.
- 5. Coffee Time on the Zoom platform will begin at the close of worship.
- If there are other events following Sunday morning worship, they, too, will be accessible on the Zoom platform, unless otherwise communicated.

Use of Facebook Live

Pilgrim will broadcast indoor worship services on Facebook Live. Using Facebook Live for broadcasting is convenient, inexpensive, and reliable. Note that you do not have to join Facebook to access Pilgrim worship services. Pilgrim's Facebook page can be reached at

facebook.com/PilgrimStPaul. Navigate to the church's Facebook page at the time of the worship service and click on the video link.

Along with in-person worship indoors, there will be periodic opportunities for Pilgrims to worship outdoors this summer.

Pilgrim Virtual Worship Is Available to Those Without Computers!

For the month of May, you can attend Pilgrim virtual morning worship by telephone. When we switch to using Facebook Live in June, the telephone option will not be available.

Those wishing to attend these worship gatherings in this way will need the following three pieces of information:

Once you have dialed the telephone number, you will be asked to enter the **Meeting ID** followed by the **# (pound sign)**, and then the **Passcode** and **pound sign.** If the gathering has not yet been started by the host, you will be asked to try again later, so please don't call in much before **9:20** am begins.

The Meeting ID and Passcode will be available in the Saturday congregational emails, for morning worship, and will also be a part of the Pilgrim general voicemail message, available on Thursdays.

A Plan for Re-opening

Re-opening Faithfully

Earlier this year, Pilgrim's SMART Team concluded that up to 54 people or up to 35 households could gather safely in Pilgrim's sanctuary if they observed proper protocols for health and safety. In March, we held our first event in the sanctuary, a time of music and prayer, with preregistration, masking, and social distancing, without singing. As we look to re-opening for in-person worship on Sunday mornings, it raises a question: How do we re-open faithfully?

As followers of Jesus, we are called to look after the whole Body of Christ. As the Apostle Paul says in I Corinthians 12, "If one member suffers, all suffer together." These words characterize the church as a place where equity and concern for the most vulnerable are important values. Paul's wise words in I Corinthians make it clear that no Christian community can afford to operate in a way that enables participation for some at the expense of others. We are called to be inclusive, respecting the needs of all as they return to gatherings in their own time and in their own way.

Three Considerations for Health and Wellbeing

With faithfulness in mind, the process of re-opening well requires us to take at least three considerations into account:

- 1. **Physical health and wellbeing.** Can we return to in-person gatherings confident that we are providing a safe and healthy environment for all participants and those connected to them? It is important for us to create a stepped process that works for the Pilgrim community of Pilgrim Lutheran Church, moving forward at a pace that is adaptable.
- 2. **Emotional health and wellbeing.** How can we provide a framework for re-opening and engage in in-person gatherings while respecting the emotional needs of participants? The pandemic has left many feeling vulnerable and fearful. We are called to respect these feelings and provide pathways to participation that reduce fear and increase confidence.
- 3. **Social health and wellbeing.** It has been a long time since we have gathered together, and it will take time for us to re-learn how to interact well with others. We are called to imagine new practices that will be warm and welcoming without making others feel nervous or uncomfortable.

Improving Pilgrim's Outreach Through Technology

Imagine going through the past year without the benefit of modern technology. Pilgrims would have had no way to access worship and learning experiences online. Because of good technical solutions, Pilgrims could participate, even those who were located far from church. As we continue on the path of re-opening, it is time to consider how Pilgrim might continue to adopt technology that helps the church reach out even more effectively. Churches like Pilgrim in the Mac-Groveland neighborhood are all considering, or have already made investments in, technology to improve their online outreach and connections. At Pilgrim, a group of staff and lay leaders have begun to explore and discuss options and ideas; you will hear more this summer as we reach out to ask for your comments.

Re-opening Practically

Any plan for re-opening under current circumstances is subject to revision as conditions change. As our journey through the pandemic continues, case numbers of COVID-19 continue to fluctuate even as the number of vaccines administered continues to grow. Implementing plans to re-open for in-person worship and other activities at Pilgrim is a balancing act, focused both on welcoming people back appropriately while also observing proper safety protocols for the safety and providing for the wellbeing of all. 



Financial Update Through March of 2021

As the first quarter of 2021 is behind us, we thought it would be a good time for a quick update on Pilgrim's finances. Through March, Pilgrim's giving has fallen behind budget by \$14,671. Although this is something we want to keep a close eye on, we believe a portion of the shortfall should be made up throughout the year. We will continue to keep everyone updated accordingly. Pilgrim received good news from our bank and the SBA. Our SBA PPP loan has been fully forgiven and thus turned into a grant. We are thankful for this!

Pilgrim's expenses through March have been underspent by \$24,909 when compared to our budgeted expenses for the same period. This does not happen without a lot of hard work and careful management from Pilgrim Staff, Ministry Teams and Members — Thank you! When looking at Pilgrim's revenues and expense through March, Pilgrim is \$9,602 ahead of budget. This is good news especially as we have started the year behind in revenues. Look for another update this summer and reach out if you have any questions.



Music Notes — May 2021

Contemplative Music and Prayer on May 9 at 6:51 pm

On Sunday, May 9 at 6:51 pm, Pilgrim will host our second event in the sanctuary with a live congregation since March 2020. Rachel Jensen, hardanger fiddle and Paul Stever, piano will play a variety of Scandinavian music with total duration of about 30 minutes. In order to minimize risks of gathering indoors to as low a level as possible for these initial gatherings, there will again be no speaking, singing, or vocalization of any kind at this event, except a few brief welcoming words from Paul. The singing bowl will be rung at several points and those in attendance are encouraged to observe a time of contemplative prayer throughout, although applause may be received after the final selection. Families and individuals will be seated at least 6 feet apart from those outside your household and masks are required for the duration. Please enter by the main sanctuary door, off St. Clair (this will likely be the only door unlocked when you arrive) and ushers will direct you to leave via one of the Prior Ave doors. Everyone who wishes to come in person **must sign** up ahead of time by noon on May 9 (no walk-ins), through the following link: tinyurl.com/PilgrimEvening0509. You may also listen on Facebook live at facebook.com/PilgrimStPaul.

Outdoor Contemplative Communion on May 16 at 6:51 pm

This will be our second-ever outdoor evening contemplative worship service. The service will be led by some of Pilgrim's evening worship musicians: Dick Hensold on pipes and recorder, Paul Stever on keyboard, and Peggy Larson performing Nordic shepherd calls and other vocals. This service will include BYO Communion. Please bring your own bread/crackers and grape juice, as well as your own masks and lawn chairs (pre-packaged communion cups with wafer will also be available from an usher when you arrive, if you prefer). As of this writing, we do not yet know if there will be any portion of this service recorded or broadcast.

Compline on May 23 at 8 pm

Pilgrim tenors and basses will be preparing a short contemplative service based on the liturgy for bedtime called "compline." We will sing the service on Facebook Live on **Sunday**, **May 23 at 8 pm** and the recording will be available for listening any time after the service. A Facebook account is not required, you can either click the link on the Pilgrim website that leads to the Facebook live events or go directly to the Pilgrim Facebook page **facebook.com/PilgrimStPaul/events**. If you missed the November 1, December 13, February 21, or March 21 compline services from this past season, you can still listen at

facebook.com/PilgrimStPaul/live.

Public Art on Pilgrim's West Lawn

The young adults at Pilgrim have been participating in a discernment process through the Riverside Innovation Hub since June 2018. The goal of this project is to help congregations innovate new connections with young adults at the intersections of their faith and their public lives.

Public Art Vision

After a lengthy discernment process, Pilgrim's young adults have chosen to use a portion of the RIH-sponsored grant funds to commission a public art piece. We have hired experienced local artists Sandy Spieler and Luisa Cabello Hansel. Sandy and Luisa have proposed an inspiring vision for transforming the west lawn of the Church into an interactive space for contemplative, creative worship and multi-generational engagement. This proposal stood out to our team because this art installation does not center around one object, but instead makes use of the whole space available to create an immersive experience.

The installation will animate the space by offering a variety of interactive features. Firstly, a spiral path incorporated into the lawn will entice worshipers or passers-by to "journey in and journey out," inviting meditative contemplation or play. The beginning of the spiral will be blessed with a land acknowledgement to honor the Dakota and Ojibwe grounding of this place. On the church walls surrounding the lawn, a path of mosaic illuminations will be mounted, each mosaic representing an aspect of our congregation's identity or celebrating a partnership, with the intention to foster gratitude for our shared world. Finally, rows of silk-screened flags will be draped around and above the space. These will be emblematic of prayer flags and can be exchanged for different seasons or celebrations.

Community engagement in the artistic creation process will be integral. Public art mosaics are Luisa's specialty. Her sentiment is that anything

and everything can be mosaic, and that we too are broken pieces and by coming together in community we make a beautiful tapestry. In the coming months, the Public Art team will invite the community into making these mosaics, as well as designing and creating the prayer flags.

The Pilgrimage to Public Art

The Riverside Innovation Hub (RIH) project is rooted in the theology of the Public Church Framework which invites faith communities to move into "their neighborhood's story, into God's story, into their own story, and into a time of discerning how God might be calling them to be proclaimers of good news into their neighborhood and with their neighbor." This process includes four stages: accompaniment, interpretation, discernment, and proclamation. The four stages were often cyclical and invited us to reflect on the learnings of previous stages. The young adults distilled our findings into two main themes: a need for a stronger and more deliberate young adult community, and a need to be more visible and inviting in our neighborhood to spark spiritual conversations. These themes grew into two projects: the young adult monthly meeting, More Than Happy Hour, and a Public Art installment.

We were drawn to the public art concept because of the abundance of artistic expression woven into Pilgrim's identity. Our conversations revealed that Pilgrim's celebration of art attracts many of our new members, whether in the form of visual art, music, poetry, or children's play. We simultaneously experiment with new ways to worship and preserve traditions. Our innovative services are intergenerational and interactive. But the young adults felt some anxiety that our congregation's values are not always visible outside the walls of our traditionally styled, somewhat imposing church in an affluent pocket of Saint Paul. We asked: How can we better engage in conversations with those who do not feel comfortable setting foot in a sanctuary? Public art is our answer.

Engagement with Pilgrim Congregation

Now it's your turn Pilgrims! We are looking for feedback about these public art concepts. We invite you to answer the question: What would be important for you to incorporate in this art? We are specifically hoping to crowdsource ideas for the mosaic illuminations, which will be mounted on the brick walls of the church surrounding the west lawn.

We are arranging three opportunities for congregation members to share their ideas and input: **May 2** following the outdoor service, **May 12** via a Zoom meeting, and **May 16** prior to the evening outdoor service.
